BIG NEWS!! The arena has been excavated with much gratitude to our friend Randy! The next step is to have holes drilled around the arena so that we can put the posts in. It's nice to have someone to trust in. It keeps the worrying to a minimum and there is a great reward at the end (more than just a nice treat to eat). If you haven't been big on trusting, give it a try. Maybe you'll encounter some disappointments but maybe not and when it works out, you'll have a great feeling. The only thing I haven't been able to figure out is what those cats do when we're traveling for a couple of days without me there to keep an eye on them. I'm sure they are probably up to no good.

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FINANCIAL UPDATE: Two of the horses had their teeth floated earlier this month, and three of them had their hoofs trimmed. These are requirements of ongoing horse health. To trim one horse's hooves is \$30, teeth filing is roughly \$200 per horse, and a ranch call is between \$25 and \$90 depending on the situation. If you would like to designate funds specifically for veterinary expenses, please specify when you make your donation.
