Winter is not officially here but the seasons seem to be changing fast. A month ago it was the mild days of an Indian summer. November 19<sup>th</sup> we had our first snow with mid-twenty temperatures at night and high thirty temperatures during the days! What happened to autumn? With the turn of the seasons, change happens. Sometimes change happens fast. November 20<sup>th</sup> started out as any other Friday, up by 6:00 AM, have a quick breakfast, clean and feed the horses, and off to work. At 2:30 p.m. Robin went to check on the animals and all seemed well. At 3:30 p.m. Steve came home from work and noticed Shana lying on the ground. At 4:30 p.m. we called our Vet to have a look. At 7:11 PM Shana died of a severe case of colic. It is a blow to us, losing our first horse. We knew it would happen eventually; it is a part of life. But it still comes as a shock when it does.

Shana was born in the spring of 1990. When she was three, she was the first horse of a 10-year old girl named Cheri. She lived in Lynden, Washington and was an active 4-H horse with Cheri. At the age of eight, Shana had a foal; a filly named DC and was a really good mom. At age 11 Shana moved to Bellingham, Washington and became the first horse of another young girl named Allison. Allison and Shana were also involved with 4-H and went to many shows together. In addition, they both had fun together enjoying an active fun Kelly Park Stables life with Halloween costume parties, Easter egg hunts and all kinds of riding and fun activities for a girl and her smart, beautiful, chestnut mare. The two of them did a bit of show jumping before Allison moved on to jumping with DC. Shana then became the first horse of another young girl named Julie. Shana and Julie quickly bonded and had a fun year together before Shana found Rachel and again became the first horse of another young girl. Rachel was in love with horses from the first time she went to an





Easter Break camp at Kelly Park Stables and the partnership between Shana and Rachel seemed to be a match made in heaven. Shana listened endlessly and patiently to the stories and musings of a young girl that never seems to run out of words. Shana helped Rachel through her years of growing up providing her with a confidant, an escape from the trials of school and pesky parent rules, and giving her freedom and an outlet like nothing else could. Around the property and surrounding neighborhood they would fly, usually with a bridle, never with a saddle, and the abandon with which they rode was

wonderful to behold. Shana was never what you would call a "school horse," just a patient and wise teacher for a few very lucky young kids.

But little girls grow up and horses grow older and Rachel had a desire to find a place where Shana could remain active but reduce the rigors of daily riding. In May 2014, Shana came to Zephaniah's Promise Ranch where she enjoyed open pastures and being pampered. During the summer, a couple of times a week, she would participate in sessions where kids from the surrounding area would come to brush her, untangle the knots in her mane, and we used her as an example for how to care for, saddle, and ride a horse. After putting some of these words down on paper, it is really no surprise at the gentleness and kindness Shana showed to kids like Emma and Alyssa. After all, that's who she was. We will miss her and are comforted in knowing God cares for animals as well as all of us and we envision her running through green pastures and watching over the young girls she helped to raise.
